## <u>Examples</u>

*My wife and I both found great new jobs last month, so things are looking up.* 

Things are finally looking up now that he's recovered from his illness.

Helen:	So when Rosie told me that things were looking up, she meant that the weather has been getting better at the moment. 原来 Rosie 是想告诉我天气 会越来越好。
Chris:	Yes, she's suggesting that it looks like the weather in general is improving Well, what do you think? Do you think the weather is getting better?
Helen:	So far, yes, yesterday was really hot. I hope it lasts for the weekend But if things get worse, would you say, 'things are looking down'? 如果事情越来 越糟,可不可以说 things are looking down?
Chris:	Not really. Instead, you could say: "It's taken a turn for the worse".
Helen:	It's taken a turn for the worse. That's a useful phrase.
Chris:	Oh, but hang on look at that black cloud in the sky. It looks like it might rain after all. Oh, that's typical English weather!
Helen:	Oh great. 哎呀,一片乌云飘过来了! Things really have taken a turn for the worse! Quick, let's get back to the office before it rains.
Chris:	Yes, let's go! Do join us again for another edition of Authentic Real English. Bye for now!
Helen:	Bye!
